

#### MISSION STATEMENT

As the most direct elected representatives of the people of Guam, the Mayors and Vice Mayors are responsible in assuring that service and benefits are delivered and provided to the respective municipalities, and that the distribution of these services are equitably facilitated, to include, but not limited to senior citizens and youth activities and facilities, public health and welfare, public security, beautification, village streets, parks and to include the installation and maintenance of public street lights, and the timely maintenance of school grounds. Additionally, humanitarian services are provide to residents through stipends for medical needs, assistance at funerals and rosaries, and other family functions as requested by the residents of any particular village.

This report shows the actual appropriation and expenditures of FY2011, and we have also included our authorized levels for FY 2012. As you will note, there is not much difference in the amount of appropriations given to the Mayors' Council of Guam from one year to the next. Yet the request for services and responsibilities of each mayoral office increases on an annual basis. Although this report does not have the actual numbers, we are still compiling and reviewing raw data on the types of request for assistance that is sought after at each of the mayoral offices.

While the Mayor's offices are only open Monday through Friday, 8am to 5pm, the work is done by any Mayor or Vice Mayor and the staff continue daily and at any hour of the day. It is truly a 24-7 operation that has over the years brought out the best in the men and women involved with the Mayors' Council of Guam. A test of their ingenuities, their use of limited resources, the use of their own out-of-pocket expenses, their patience, and, indeed, their love and belief in the people they serve in their communities. We do with what we have, and even with what we don't have, but we always do our tasks simply because we know that, in the end, no one else will do it and our residents expect it of each and every Mayor's office.

#### THE FUTURE

Guam continues to grow. Village populations are fluctuating, but what one village loses as a resident, another village gains. The Mayors' Council of Guam has always tried to be supportive of each other, in terms of sharing equipment, sharing ideas, and even sharing employees, and at times sharing budget expenditures. There is a huge irony when budget allocations are made equal to all villages even when village populations are hugely unequal. We look towards the day when perhaps the Guam Legislature will revisit how appropriations are made for services in the villages so that there is equality and a level playing field for all. We have engaged the Guam Legislature through the office of Senator Tina Muna Barnes to assist the Mayors' Council of Guam is finding the most appropriate and equitable way of dividing appropriations for village operations and needs. We know that requests for services will not diminish and neither will the cost of providing for these services. Every penny given to the Mayors' Council of Guam is appreciated and in turn results in an agency that spends frugally but serves all.

We have sought through our budget submissions an appropriation for legal services and account technicians or contracted accounting services to assist us in keeping our financial books and records. The Mayors' Council of Guam continues to receive more mandates for services to be provided and concurrently is given funds to assist with those mandates.

Section 4. Streets Maintenance and Beautification. The sum of Four Hundred Seventy Thousand Nine Hundred Twenty-one Dollars (\$470,921) is appropriated from the Tourist Attraction Fund to the Mayors Council of Guam for Fiscal Year 2011 for the maintenance and beautification of village secondary and tertiary roads, and for the operations of the Mayors' offices, but not for personnel costs. Said funds shall not be subject to any transfer authority of I Maga'låhen Guåhan, and shall be divided among the Village Mayors as follows:

- (a) Each Mayor shall receive the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000);
   and
- (b) The remaining balance of the fund shall be distributed to each Mayor pro rata based on the total road mileage in his village as a percentage of Guam's total road mileage in the most current report of Guam Roads Pavement Inventory of the Department of Public Works.
- Section 5. Island-wide Village Beautification Projects. The sum of One Million Thirty-six Thousand Twenty-six Dollars (\$1,036,026) is appropriated from the Tourist Attraction Fund to the Mayors Council of Guam for Island-wide Village Beautification Projects to include:
- (a) the maintenance and repair of the village's recreational facilities under the jurisdiction of the Mayor;
  - (b) the maintenance and repair of each village's main roads; and
- (c) the planting and maintenance of each village's official flower and other flowering plants, shrubs and trees adjacent to the village's main roads, public restrooms and recreational facilities. A Mayor may contract with a private entity to provide the

services authorized by this Section, subject to the Guam Procurement Law, Chapter 5, Title 5, Guam Code Annotated.

Section 6. Grounds Maintenance for Schools. Subject to approval and scheduling of the public school principals, the Mayors are responsible for regular ground maintenance of Guam Department of Education school grounds in their respective districts where ground maintenance is not already subject to an existing contract for a minimum of twice a month during a regular school calendar year. Subject to approval of scheduling with the public school principals, the Mayor may contract with a private entity to provide the services authorized by this Section.

The sum of Four Hundred Eighty Thousand Six Hundred Forty-seven Dollars (\$480,647) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Mayors Council of Guam Revolving Fund for the grounds maintenance of specified schools of the Department of Education, to be allocated as follows:

Section 8. Public Safety and Social Education Programs. The sum of Four Hundred Forty-seven Thousand Three Hundred Seventy-five Dollars (\$447,375) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Mayors Council of Guam, with each village to receive Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000), and with the remaining funds to the Mayors Council of Guam, for Fiscal Year 2011, to be expended in accordance with plans approved by the Mayors Council of Guam or respective Village Municipal Planning Council and filed with the Director of Administration, to fund public safety and social education programs that enforce alcohol regulations, reduce underage drinking, support traffic safety, reduce drug-related violence and abuse, to support government of Guam substance abuse prevention programs, and to support organized sports programs in the community.
